# **Backlit**

For backlit photography (or "contre-jour" if you want to sound clever...) the main light source needs to be behind the main subject. Look for interesting foreground shadows that draw your eye into the picture; surreal patterns of light/shade; silhouettes; rim lighting; etc. But remember to keep an eye on the exposure, as your camera is likely to be fooled by a very bright background. Spot metering might be helpful in this case.

#### Fruit, nuts and berries

A wide choice here, from traditional still-life shots to market stalls, to berry-laden trees and shrubs in autumn and winter. A well-known chocolate bar might be a useful element to include here...!

### **Looking up**

The main criterion here is that you (or at least your camera) must be pointing upwards. You or your camera could lie flat on the ground and look up at flowers from underneath; Oxford is full of nice gargoyles and grotesques – for these you will need to look up. Or higher still, look out for unusual or dramatic clouds. Use your imagination for this one!

#### **Texture**

Your image should convey a sense of touch – rough, smooth, prickly, etc. or of a pattern. Fabrics all have textures and patterns, as do rocks, plants etc. Look out for textures in unexpected environments, to produce something different here.

#### Wood

Trees, forests, twigs, branches, furniture and carvings. The challenge here is to produce an image that declares "wood" to the viewer, but is also something unusual or quirky. Note regarding carvings/sculptures: judges look for the photographer's added value to someone else's art.

## **Old and New**

The image should show the relationship or contrast between objects of different ages – animals, plants, architecture, vehicles, etc. – such as an old church next to a modern office building.

And do remember – any photo including a young person must, if possible, have his/her parent or guardian's permission to be shown at a club event, including online meetings.
